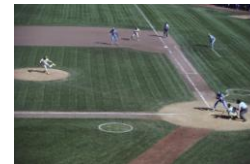

Medical Assisting Candle Light Ceremony

The Adult Career Center held the annual Pinning and Candle Lighting Ceremony for the Medical Assisting Class on Thursday, April 28. The pinning ceremony is the culmination of the initial journey to medical assisting education and signifies the educational preparation of the wearer.

The Medical Assisting students honor the dedication of Florence Nightingale, who because of her selfless duty during the Crimean War became known as the “lady with the lamp.” As a tribute to Florence’s dedication each participant in the ceremony carried a candle. The use of candles is not accidental as light symbolizes life, knowledge and hope. It has been encountered many times in the graduates’ journey and as a result these students commit to bringing a light to the lives of others. Their education efforts are to be commended. Computerized Business Technology Work Based Learning

Students enrolled in the Adult Career Center’s Computerized Business Technology program have begun a three-week, 120-hour work-based learning experience as the final stage in their 9-month training program. Since September, the students have been intensely training for careers as Medical/Secretarial Office Support, Electronic Health Records Support, Accounting Clerks, Microsoft Certified Application Specialists and Administrative Assistants.

For three weeks, CBT students will work at local businesses in their specialty areas to take their classroom learning to the next level. While on the job, students will be exposed to professional attitudes, learn how to interact with business professionals, have the opportunity to apply their knowledge, and be involved with work place dynamics. Companies accommodating students for their internships include: Elyria Internal Medicine, Ridge Tool, NYC Office of Chief Medical Examiner, Attorney Matthew Hawley, EMH, RAK Corrosion Control, Kingston of Vermilion, Montgomery Chiropractic Center, Inc., Fisher-Titus Medical Center, Vermilion River Regional Vet Hospital, Coleys Inc., Kendal at Oberlin, and Angney’s Import Service. Three of the CBT students have recently been gainfully employed at EMH, Nelson Stud Welding, and Fidelity National Financial. We are thankful to our business partners for their role in preparing our students for the work force!

Experiences such as these are a powerful way the JVS Adult Career Center helps our students to succeed.
